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Over the last two weeks, so much has happened around the world and here in New Zealand. As every country battles the coronavirus pandemic, every day we seem to lose more of the normality we once had.

Our way of life in our work, our homes, our churches and our communities have been impacted, or are about to be, in a way that none of us has ever experienced in our lifetime. Business owners, employers and employees are nervous about job security and the entire financial world is nervously concerned about a pending global recession.

New Zealanders are racing to come home to join loved-ones. Funerals, weddings and social gatherings are all bearing the brunt of being ordered to limit attendees. The New Zealand Government has dramatically put in place a \$12 billion support package for the next 12 weeks. Unprecedented.

The Government is trying to create an environment of financial stability but most economists admit it is only a short-term fix. Unprecedented.

All large public gatherings over 100 are banned. Unprecedented.

Many churches have ceased Sunday services. Unprecedented.

Many Doctors and nurses are now meeting you in the carpark dressed in hazmat gear. Unprecedented.

People are fighting over toilet paper. Unprecedented.

Our mostly optimistic nation is rattled with uncertainty. No. 8 wire will not fix this! Unprecedented.

We are encouraged to have limited social contact. Unprecedented.

Today, the Government strategically moved the COVID-19 level to Level 3, announcing that in 48 hours this will shift to Level 4. This means New Zealand, apart from essential service will be in mandatory lockdown. Unprecedented!

Exodus – Commandments are engraved on stone by the finger of God Himself. Unprecedented.

Joshua – The earth did not rotate for an entire day as the sun stood still. Unprecedented.

1 Samuel – A shepherd boy slays a giant with one stone. Unprecedented.

1 Samuel – A Shepherd boy named David becomes the greatest King of Israel. Unprecedented.
